A Snapshot of Boston

- > Total 617,591 residents
 - 44.7% non-Latino White
 - 22.9% non-Latino Black
 - 19.5% Latino
 - 9.5% Asian/Pacific Islander
 - 2.3% 2 or more races
 - 1.1% other race
 - 20% of population living in poverty
- > 17% of population age 18 or younger
- Active advocacy and health care presence






Boston Housing Authority

- Houses about 10% of Boston population
- 14,000 units, 64 Developments
- Average Income @ \$15,573 for a family of four
- Aging properties and pest infestation

Asthma in Boston

- Boston has the highest rate of asthma hospitalizations for children under 10 in the state of Massachusetts*
- 23.8% of adults in rental assistance & 10.8% in public housing report doctor diagnosed asthma compared to 9% in market rate housing**
- 66% of Boston residents live in renteroccupied housing units





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



BPHC Establishes Healthy Homes

- Created the program in 1999 to address high disparities rates of asthma in Boston & public housing through:
 - Asthma home visit (education & interventions) provided by sustainable model using CHW
 - Integration of asthma services across clinical and community-based settings
 - Data surveillance & monitoring by housing type
 - Policies, systems and environmental change (PSEs)

Description of Healthy Pest Free Public Housing

- Supported by W K Kellogg Foundation
- Partnership between Boston Public Health Commission, Boston Housing Authority and Boston University School of Public Health
- Multi-pronged intervention with standardized IPM contracts for developments, resident education, and pesticide buy back
- Reductions in work orders for pests








Breathe Easy at Home Program



- Innovative web-based referral program in Boston to address asthma in the home environment. Partners include (medical, enforcement, legal, housing and community advocates)
- Allows clinicians to request home inspections for patients with asthma electronically in fast paced environment
- 70% of cases are resolved without court intervention

Breathe Easy Through the Years



Smoke Free Housing

- Boston Housing Authority (BHA) began the process to go Smoke Free with all rental housing in 2010 and implemented in 2012
- Collaboration between BHA,
 Boston Public Health
 Commission (BPHC), and
 Committee for Boston Public
 Housing for resident
 outreach/education
- BPHC also began Smoke free rental housing registry

BOSTON HOUSING AUTHORITY RESIDENTS: HOW TO REPORT A SMOKING VIOLATION

No smoking allowed inside BHA apartments, buildings, or within 15 feet of the building.

Smoke Free Housing

Boston Smoke-Free Homes:

 Works with landlords and housing management across every market spectrum on the adoption & implementation of smoke free policies





To date over 63,000 affordable units has transitioned into smoke free units, impacting 157,000 Boston residents

Boston REACH: Partners in Health & Housing

- Initiative goal was to improve the health of residents, especially Black and Latino residents, living in BHA and BHA-Administered Rental Assisted/Section 8 Housing to:
 - Improve the quality of & access to smoke free housing
 - Improve access to & consumption of healthy food
 - Increase linkages to community health and social services and resources



Rental Registration and Inspection Ordinance

- In 2012, Boston Inspectional Services passed a pro-active "Rental Registration and Inspection Ordinance"
- Requires annual registration of all 150,000 private rental units in Boston with contact phone number, in state agent
- All units inspected every 5 years
- Important advocacy to pass ordinance from medical providers, tenant advocate, public health partners




Health Outcomes




- Overall asthma & smoking & rates have decreased
 - Over 4 percent decline since 2011
 - Asthma rate in Boston
 Housing Authority has
 decrease by 7 percent since
 2013-2017
 - Resident smoking rate at BHA decreased by 5 percent from 2013-2017
 - Diabetes rate decreased slightly

Boston Smoking Rates By Housing Type in 2013, 2015, 2017





Other Success

- Boston ISD complaints against BHA have declined more than 70 percent
- Post the pro-active "Rental Registration and Inspection Ordinance" resident inspection complaints decreased by 17 percent
- Overall court prosecution against landlords are down by 30%
- 126,000 units registered and over 33,000 pro-active inspections.
 Proactive inspections are up by 60 %
- In 2017 <0.1% of children with lead Levels of 25 μg/dL.
- 2018 Venous Blood Levels ≥ 10 μg/dL (reduced from 25 μg/dL)




ISD Complaints Post-Ordinance
